By the end of studying Act 2 Scene 4 I need to know;

Plot: Ross and an old man recall the scene of the murder. Macduff states that Duncan's two sons Malcolm and Donalbain have fled suspected of paying Duncan's guards to commit the murder. Macbeth has been nominated king and gone to Scone to be crowned. Macduff, who may now suspect Macbeth's involvement in the murder of Duncan, states he is not attending Macbeth's coronation. The witches prophecy is once again confirmed.

Ideas - Shakespeare invites the audience to pause and reflect on the actions and events so far in the play. Shakespeare prepares the audience for the next round of murders that Macbeth will initiate.

Deeper understanding	The old man is significant in what he represents, tradition and natural continuity, as well as wisdom are all bound up in this single figure. He represents the people, in his memory these crimes are unparalleled. Daylight has been replaced by night; a falcon (a bird of prey) has been killed by an owl, a much smaller creature; and the horses of the king's stables are said to have eaten each other. All the named events are not simply natural disasters; they are reversals of the expected natural order. The reference to the murder being 'gainst nature still' when Ross talks of the belief that Malcolm and Donalbain were responsible further reinforces the sentiment that the crime goes against the natural order. Macduff's refusal to go to Scone marks the first hints at his suspicions- potentially as a result of
Quotes	Mousing owl - A01 'Strange' 'unnatural' How the world seems since Duncan's murder. 'falcon towering in her pride of place/Was by a mousing owl hawked at and killed'. The falcon life has come to an end just like Duncan's. This is not the natural order of things. 'Those that Macbeth hath slain' Ross - 'Gainst nature still!'
	'God's benison'. The old man blesses Ross as a well-meaning person who will try to make the best of things and reconcile adversaries.
