Ally A (typically) straight and/or cis person who supports members of the LGBT community. Bi Describes a romantic and/or sexual orientation towards more than one gender.

The fear or dislike of someone who identifies as bi based on prejudice or negative attitudes, beliefs or views about bi **Biphobia**

people.

Term used in LBT culture to describe someone who expresses themselves in a typically masculine way. You shouldn't **Butch**

use these terms about someone unless you know they identify with them.

Someone whose gender identity is the same as the sex they were assigned at birth. Non-trans is also used by some Cisgender

people

Coming out When a person first tells someone/others about their orientation and/or gender identity.

Calling someone by their birth name after they have changed their name. This term is often associated with trans Deadnaming

people who have changed their name as part of their transition.

Femme is a term used in LGBT culture to describe someone who expresses themselves in a typically feminine way. You Femme

shouldn't use these terms about someone unless you know they identify with them.

Refers to a man who has a romantic and/or sexual orientation towards men. Also a generic term for lesbian and gay sexuality - some women define themselves as gay rather than lesbian. Some non-binary people may also identify with

this term.

Often expressed in terms of male/female, gender is largely culturally determined and is assumed from the sex assigned Gender

at birth.

Used to describe when a person experiences discomfort or distress because there is a mismatch between their sex **Gender Dysphoria**

assigned at birth and their gender identity. Also the clinical diagnosis.

Gender Expression How a person chooses to outwardly express their gender, within the context of societal expectations of gender.

A person's innate sense of their own gender, whether male, female or something else (see non-binary below), which

may or may not correspond to the sex assigned at birth.

Another way of describing a person's transition. Can include medical intervention, n changing names, pronouns, **Gender Reassignment**

dressing differently and living in their self-identified gender.

A term used in medical law to decide whether a child (under 16 years of age) is able to consent to their own medical **Gillick Competence**

treatment, without the need for parental permission or knowledge.

Refers to a man who has a romantic and/or sexual orientation towards women or to a woman who has a romantic Heterosexual

and/or sexual orientation towards men.

Homophobia The fear or dislike of someone, based on prejudice or negative attitudes, beliefs or views about lesbian, gay or bi people.

Describes a person having the biological attributes of both sexes or whose biological attributes do not fit with societal

assumptions about what constitutes male or female.

Refers to a woman who has a romantic and/or sexual orientation towards women. Some non-binary people may also Lesbian

identify with this term.

Neurodiverse A concept where neurological differences are recognised and respected in the same way as any other human difference.

An umbrella term for people whose gender identity doesn't sit comfortably with 'man' or 'woman'. Non-binary

Non-Binary identities are varied and can include people who identify with some aspects of binary identities, while others reject

An umbrella term describing a person's attraction to other people. This attraction may be sexual (sexual orientation) Orientation

and/or romantic (romantic orientation).

When a lesbian, gay, bi or trans person's sexual orientation or gender identity is disclosed to someone else without their Outed

consent.

Pan Refers to a person whose romantic and/or sexual attraction towards others is not limited by sex or gender.

Passing If someone is regarded, at a glance, to be a cisgender man or cisgender woman.

Pronouns Words we use to refer to people's gender in conversation - for example, 'he' or 'she' 'they or their'.

Queer Queer is a term used by those wanting to reject specific labels of romantic orientation, sexual orientation and/or gender

identity. Can be viewed as a slur, it was reclaimed in the late 80s by the queer community who have embraced it.

Questioning The process of exploring your own sexual orientation and/or gender identity.

An umbrella term to describe people whose gender is not the same as, or does not sit comfortably with, the sex they Trans

were assigned at birth.

A term used to describe someone who is assigned female at birth but identifies and lives as a man. This may be Trans man

shortened to trans man, or FTM, an abbreviation for female-to-male.

A term used to describe someone who is assigned male at birth but identifies and lives as a woman. This may be Trans woman

shortened to trans woman, or MTF, an abbreviation for male-to-female.

The steps a trans person may take to live in the gender with which they identify. Each person's transition will involve **Transitioning**

different things. And include medical/social transitions

The fear or dislike of someone based on the fact they are trans, including denying their gender identity or refusing to Transphobia

accept it. Transphobia may be targeted at people who are, or who are perceived to be, trans.

Undetectable

HIV medication (antiretroviral treatment, or ART) works by reducing the amount of the virus in the blood to undetectable levels. This means the levels of HIV are so low that the virus cannot be passed on. Also known as undetectable viral load
